

Amended Ordinance: LL.M. Two Year Program Effective From: 2026-27

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Following Amendment is incorporated in existing ordinance of LL.M. Two Year Program:

1.	6. Examination A. General: (i) There shall be a College examination at the end of the First, Second, Third, and Fourth Semester and the candidate for the Degree of Master of Laws shall be required to pass in all the prescribed courses within a maximum period of four years from the year of his being admitted to the First Semester. (ii) Subject to the provisions of these Ordinances, the College Examination for the Degree of Master of Laws shall be held in T.R.C. Law College, Barabanki at such time and on the dates as the Academic Council may prescribe. (iii) (a) A candidate shall be examined in 13 (Thirteen) written papers, each paper carrying one hundred marks and covering prescribed courses of study. (b) Examination shall be conducted by means of written papers, each carrying 70 marks and of three hours duration. (c) In each paper 30 marks shall be reserved for award on the basis of performance in the class room. (d) Dissertation shall carry 150 marks. (e) The Viva-Voce Examination shall carry 100 marks and shall be held as soon after the Fourth Semester Examination. (f) The Candidate shall produce one Certificate of Paper Presentation in a National/International Seminar and Publication of Research Paper in UGC Journal, within the academic year with Supervisor, to the Head of the P.G. Department. It shall carry 50 marks.	1. Examination A. General: I. There shall be a College examination at the end of the First, Second, Third, and Fourth Semester and the candidate for the Degree of Master of Laws shall be required to pass in all the prescribed courses within a maximum period of four years from the year of his being admitted to the First Semester. II. Subject to the provisions of these Ordinances, the College Examination for the Degree of Master of Laws shall be held in T.R.C. Law College, Barabanki at such time and on the dates as the Academic Council may prescribe. III. (a) A candidate shall be examined in 14 (Fourteen) written papers, each paper carrying one hundred marks and covering prescribed courses of study. b) Examination shall be conducted by means of written papers, each carrying 70 marks and of three hours duration. c) In each paper 30 marks shall be reserved for award on the basis of performance in the class room. These marks are divided equally into three categories: Assignment, Presentation, and Mid-Semester Examination, with 10 marks allotted to each respectively. d) Dissertation shall carry 200 marks. e) The Viva-Voce Examination shall carry 100 marks and shall be held as soon after the Fourth Semester Examination. f) This section repealed.

regular course of study for the said examination. (ii) Written Paper: A candidate for the LL.M. Degree Examination shall be examined in 13 (Thirteen) papers as mentioned in Schedule A. (iii) Dissertation: (a) Candidate shall be required to submit the Dissertation at least two weeks before the commencement of Fourth Semester Examination. (b) The dissertation must include a plagiarism check certificate, duly signed by both the Head of the P.G. Department and the Supervisor. (c) The candidate shall be required to secure at least 50% marks in the Dissertation to pass the Examination. (d) The Examiner shall either- (i) Award at least 50% marks, or (ii) Return the Dissertation for revision, or (iii) Reject the Dissertation. (e) The candidate who's Dissertation is returned for revision may revise the dissertation and re-submit it within a period of two months. Failure to submit in time shall result in a declaration that the candidate has failed at the relevant LL.M. Examination. (f) A Dissertation can be revised only once. If the candidate fails to secure pass marks in the revised Dissertation he shall be declared failed in the LL.M. Examination. (g) A Dissertation shall be examined by a Board of two examiners at least one of them shall necessarily be an external examiner. (h) The evaluation of the two examiners shall be coordinated as here under: (i) Each examiner shall award marks out of 150. (j) If the marks awarded by two examiners vary by 20 marks or more then in such case the average marks will be awarded, The decision of the Principal shall be final, in case of any controversy. (k) If one of the examiners return the Dissertation for revision or rejects the Dissertation, his	prosecuted a regular course of study for the said examination. (ii) Written Paper: A candidate for the LL.M. Degree Examination shall be examined in 14 (Fourteen) papers as mentioned in Revised Schedule A. (iii) Dissertation: (a) Candidate shall be required to submit the Dissertation at least two weeks before the commencement of Fourth Semester Examination. (b) The dissertation must include a plagiarism check certificate maximum allowed up to 15 (Fifteen) percent, duly signed by both the Head of the P.G. Department and the Supervisor. (c) The candidate shall be required to secure at least 50% marks in the Dissertation to pass the Examination. (d) The Examiner shall either- (i) Award at least 50% marks, or (ii) Return the Dissertation for revision, or (iii) Reject the Dissertation. (e) The candidate who's Dissertation is returned for revision may revise the dissertation and re-submit it within a period of two months. Failure to submit in time shall result in a declaration that the candidate has failed at the relevant LL.M. Examination. (f) A Dissertation can be revised only once. If the candidate fails to secure pass marks in the revised Dissertation he shall be declared failed in the LL.M. Examination. (g) A Dissertation shall be examined by a Board of two examiners at least one of them shall necessarily be an external examiner. (h) The evaluation of the two examiners shall be coordinated as here under: (i) Each examiner shall award marks out of 100. (j) If the marks awarded by two examiners vary by 20 marks or more then in such case

(c) The Viva-Voce Examination shall carry 100 marks. (d) The candidate shall be required to obtain a minimum of 50 marks to pass the Viva Voce Examination. (v) Seminar: The Candidate shall have to attend a National/International Seminar in the academic year and must produce certificate of paper presentation in the same and Publication of Research Paper with supervisor in UGC Journal to the Head of Department. It is mandatory to submit in the Fourth Semester and shall carry 50 marks.	the average marks will be awarded, The decision of the Principal shall be final, in case of any controversy. (d) The candidate shall be required to obtain a minimum of 50 marks to pass the Viva Voce Examination. (v) Seminar: This section repealed.
